During an interview over some ice fishing in 2014, I took on a job that would shape the next decade of my life. As the lodge grew, so did our goals. From just two full-time employees, we grew to six; the seasons grew longer, and the number of flights increased five-fold. It has been an extraordinary journey to be on. The future is looking bright; we have big plans to continue improving our infrastructure and add some exciting new fishing opportunities. In 1996, Scott Lake Lodge set a new path of growth and improvement. Change has been a constant, while the values upon which the lodge was built stayed the same. We've been handed a big responsibility. Ron Spork and I, along with the rest of the Scott Lake team, will work tirelessly to improve and grow Scott Lake Lodge, while preserving the feeling and culture that have made this place so special for so many years.

Each day, we strive for the seamless integration of a hotel, a restaurant, an outfitting service, and now a not-so-small air service. It takes a dedicated team in all departments: maintenance, construction, hospitality, kitchen, guides, pilots, management and ownership. We all must work in concert to the same goals. It's impressive and humbling to work with this group. They deserve thanks, as do their families, who graciously share their time with the lodge. Shirley in Wisconsin, Donna in Saskatoon, and Karye and Janice in Edmonton all play key roles in the smooth operation, from the first email to the moment guests step off the plane, tired and happy, back in Edmonton. Running a logistically complex operation on the 60th Parallel isn't done alone. A fleet of partners in Saskatoon, Prince Albert, Stony Rapids, Edmonton and beyond help keep the wheels turning and ensure we are well supplied to chase fish across 10 million acres of northern Canada.

Turning back to 2025, and the year that was, fishing was superb, truly record-setting. Each day listening to the trophy announcements (aka the Nuggets & Sierra Show) was jaw-dropping in the number of big fish that hit the nets. The guide team was on fire! Backing up, before guests were making casts and even before the ice was out, our winter and spring teams spent weeks on the island working on a multitude of projects. A nice sauna renovation resulted in near daily use. Loon Cabin was given an expansion and a full facelift, while the brand-new Otter Cabin replaced one of the shared wall cabins that was renovated. By the time the first float plane touched down, the island was looking great.

Wildfire concerns were real. In late May, the spring crew worked in weather into the 80s. But it was short-lived as the first of June saw a healthy dose of snow and rain. This continued just when we needed it all summer. No fires ever threatened Scott. We got off lucky in one of the worst fire years in central Canada for a while. Starting in July, we had our first anglers fly north to Mosquito Lake to ply the tundra waters for big grayling and trout; we found both as we had hoped — plentiful and large! The animal sightings were frequent, and the draw of the barren ground landscape was intense. We hope to bring more lakes into the fishing fold. They are big, some have storied histories, and we are wild with excitement to have our anglers start exploring them.

The 2026 season started for us on Sept. 11, 2025, at about 6 pm. The last group of guests had left the island, a few yells were heard, glasses clinked, and then, over a couple of whiskeys, the planning phase was underway. We added another bulk fuel tank this fall to support growing aviation demand, and new docks, boats, motors and fishing gear were ordered. Cabin renovations are underway for Wolf and Wolverine, and more staff accommodations are in the works. The process starts again, the bar is raised each year, and it takes a profoundly committed group that pulls all these items together. They deserve a special nod. I'm proud to work with them.

Another Record-Setting Year!

May 31, 2025, saw the first floats touch the water. Getting to the float base in Stony Rapids proved to be a challenge, as May in central Canada saw early and massive wildfires, with roads closed. The crew started at midnight to bypass the blockades and drove the 1,000 km (600 miles) north. With a clear path to the back dock, people and dogs were greeted by the spring construction crew that had choppered in some weeks earlier to an island still in the grips of a late winter with lots of snow. They were ready to take on the latest in a continuing (and growing) list of improvements at Scott, and hopeful for some warmer weather. They got it! Although the breakup was on time, the fires created some unrest and challenges right off the bat. Scott Lake, sitting on the 60th parallel, was

fire-free, having had beautiful spring weather. However, the only road north and the gateway for the first 50,000 lbs of food, liquor and all manner of freight was closed. Further, most of the float plane fleet was stuck in Flin Flon, MB, due to fires, which forced the town to be evacuated and trapped the aircraft before they could get them into the water. It was shaping up for a dicey start, but our June 1st snowstorm and a few subsequent days of rain quelled any immediate fire risk and topped up lake levels. High water tends to equate to excellent pike fishing, and things were shaping up. There were a few tense days, but through the incredible work by our transportation partners, things were looking good, staff were in, freight had arrived, the island was looking great, and we had two planes on the dock. It was time to fish!

The Week 1-ers didn't waste any time setting the bar: big pike and big trout in the shallows were the order of the day under spring sun. They landed 136 trophy-sized fish. This got the ball rolling, and we didn't look back. Since 1999, Scott Lake has kept records of fishing success: the number of trophy fish, where they were caught, and by whom. As the early days of, shall we say, limited catch-and-release become a dot in the rearview mirror, our current fisheries management plan is starting to show.

Simply put, it takes a long time to grow big fish in the north, 25-30 years for huge pike, often more than double that for lake trout. By spreading pressure across many new lakes and with incredibly careful fish-handling by our guide team, the good old days are now. An emerging attitude among customers and guides is that each fish doesn't need a photo and can be admired boatside and unhooked in the water, letting them grow and be enjoyed by more adventurous anglers. 2025 was once again a record-setting year for total trophies landed, an astounding 3,282, eclipsing the previous record, set in 2024 by 556 fish. These numbers are impressive; however, within them lie a series of incredible days and stories by our 532 guests. It's impossible to capture everything that happens in a season at Scott. Each day seems to pack in a week's worth of adventure and excitement, and 2025 was truly special.

Peter Myhre, a frequent visitor, had some fantastic days pike fishing. On the hunt with guide J5, they landed nearly 20 fish more than 40" on a sunny day on Selwyn Lake, close to, if not a record. The parade of big pike started in the first week and really hit its stride in the second. Vinny Purpura found a shallow bay stacked with eager pike. In short order, he landed a 47", just surpassing Ross Purpura Sr.'s pair of 46.5 inchers. Peggy Light also found a 47" giant early in the season, only to incredibly pass this with a second fish of a lifetime late in the season with a 47.5".

As the weather ebbs and flows, the fishing reacts in kind. In warm, stable weather, the fishing is hot; in cool and windy weather, it's tougher. Even in this pristine location with amazing opportunities, some days are more challenging than others. The significant mitigating factor is our guide team. Each year, they refine, learn and create big-fish memories on even the toughest days. It's incredible to witness how they continue to explore the nearly 2 million acres of water and find new spots to ambush fish. In the third week, our anglers worked hard for the fish; the weather was a roller coaster, but the bites were there. Bill Calabresa and partner Joe Novicki were the first two anglers to catch trophies in all three species and were the first two members of the 100+ Club for the season. They started a record-setting trend: we have not had more anglers chase Grayling, nor reached the lofty goal of the 100+ Club. A staggering 63 people will receive their custom jackets this fall. Did we mention fishing was on fire? A record-setting 717 big grayling were caught, as many more anglers were in the rapids, tempting these brilliant fighters on dry flies and small spinners. Days spent exploring these wild rivers in the Northwest Territories never disappoint in adventure.

By mid-June, our Cessna Caravan escaped the wildfire evacuation zone, and we were really flying. This opened some new opportunities for us.

Young Coyen Kristo was on the hunt for a big fish and found one, a massive 48" pike that was lurking in the sundrenched shallows, a fish nearly as long as he is tall! Winds blew and made the fish slip deeper, but it didn't stop Jim Kusar from having an epic 10-trophy day on a flyout to the Dubwant River system. The biggest was another 4-footer. The flyout network is ever-increasing and already incredibly vast; it allows for adventure, explo-

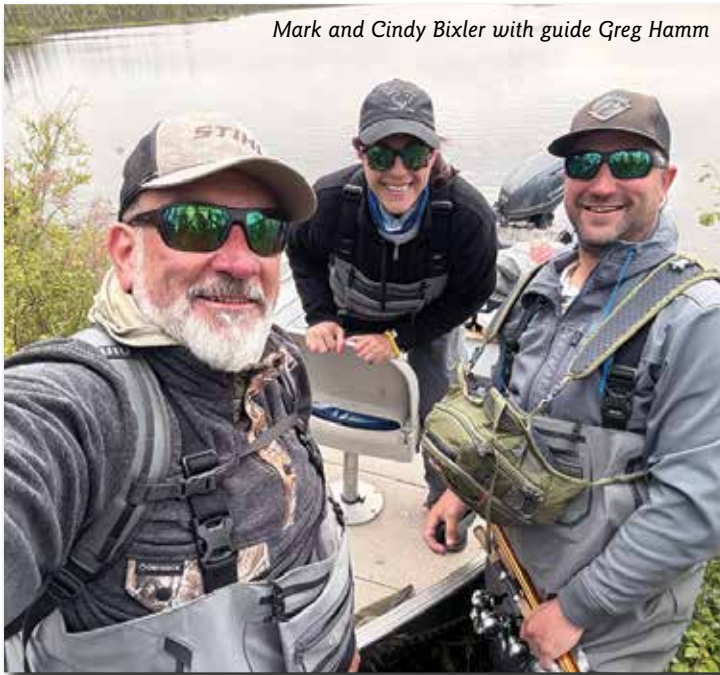

ration and the chance to spread fishing pressure across a mind-blowing 2 million acres. Mid-July saw a new flyout option come online as soon as the ice melted. Tukto Lodge on Mosquito Lake finally became ice-free around July 4; winter is seriously long at that latitude. Our first anglers found trout everywhere up shallow. The inflowing and outflowing rivers were hot spots, loaded with trout of all sizes chasing and chowing large grayling. Early adventurers Bob and Suzanne Noble had quite a day, with many top-end grayling and countless trout. Father-son duo Floyd and Caden Burnside were treated to big trout flat line trolling and a mess of huge grayling. Our anglers were treated to a show on the tundra. Wildlife sightings were frequent, with caribou jogging down the sandy beaches, muskox on the barren hillsides and a big first: Desiree Curfman and her guide Sean spotted movement just around the point from the camp. As they drew closer, they confirmed their suspicions; it was not one but four Barren Ground Grizzly Bears, a sow and three cubs. After a few photos and videos, they decided to take action, since our pilot was fishing on the shore not far away.

Another father-son pair, Lance and Landon Marcinek, both caught some incredible fish. Lance got the ball rolling with a 48" pike early in the trip, enjoying his toast of bourbon from the 4-Foot Club decanter. His son, Landon, was determined to catch one just as large; he waited until the very end after shore lunch on the final day, nailing a 48" of his own, briefly giving him top honors in the 100+ Club. Celebrations ensued. Mike Rogers, a long-time Scott visitor, edged above Landon for the third largest tally, while Kim Brown earned her first jacket with a 108.5 total inches. The top spot this year went to Bernie Heile, using his good karma and big smile to reach a lofty total of 110".

Late in the season, another new lake, Firedrake, came online, using the Caravan's speed to make the distance in a hurry. Matt and Amanda Yackel were the first anglers to test it out. They found another tundra giant, nearly 100,000 acres of water to fish, and many hungry pike and trout. This one will be on the list of destinations to watch as the guides learn this inland ocean and all the connecting waterbodies.

These numbers are pushing the bar and expectations ever farther, but still don't capture the fishing reports in the Last Cast Bar:

This season, an average of 170 trophy fish hit the nets each week, allowing many anglers to catch more than a few. You never quite know when all the stars and weather will align. Our top three weeks of the season for significant fish productivity were Week 4 with 227, Week 10 at 257, and at the top of the heap was Week 15 at just a ridiculous 269 trophy fish. These numbers are pushing the bar and expectations ever farther, but still don't capture the fishing reports in the Last Cast Bar: "I've never had so many mid to high 30's pike...we just caught a ton."

As the weeks rolled along, we continued to have an incredible season. Our staff was in superb form this year, meshing well and rising to the challenge of making the

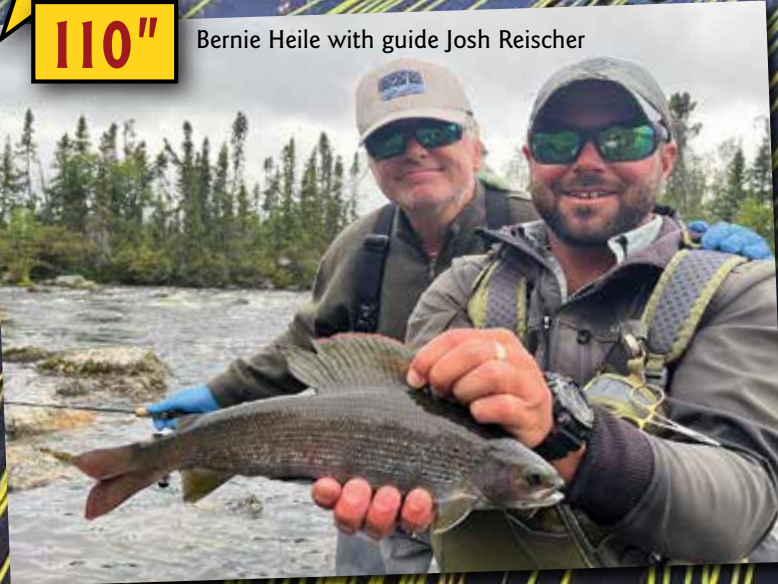

FISHANCIAL STATEMENT

For the Fishing Season Ended September 11, 2025

Management Discussion and Analysis

OPERATIONS:

Each day in season feels like a week's worth of activities crammed into a 24-hour period, with a lot happening at any given moment. In 2025, our management team navigated all the moving parts quite smoothly. The early challenges of wildfires, which closed the supply routes and grounded float planes, were overcome with quick pivots and great help from Caribou Transport and Wings Over Kississing, both shining partners without which this operation and its nearly 500,000 lbs of food, fuel and freight cannot move. Our Edmonton Team of Karye, Janice and the rest of the North Cariboo/Executive Flight Center always started and finished the trips with laughs and great hospitality. The move to Edmonton has been great. Scott Lake Lodge has grown over the past years. The operation is larger and more complex, and we have more people working year-round to ensure we live up to the goal we set: to make each consecutive visit from our guests the best fishing trip they have ever had. It's a tall order; we don't take your business for granted, and we have a unique, talented group working on a staggering number of details. We seemed to smooth out the planes and the pilot situation in 2025; we had three full-timers and a host of part-timers and fill-ins. Float planes will always be one of our biggest challenges, requiring extensive investments in fuel storage and winter freighting. Our charter partner, Wings Over Kississing, offered excellent support again this season, freeing up our planes to keep guests heading to the far-off flyouts. Our management team and staff shone in 2025. By the time this shows up in your mailbox, we will be well on our way to 2026, with a bit of sunshine and south winds. We expect it to be a banner year.

Staffing:

We were again extremely fortunate to have so many staff members return to the 60th Parallel to do the job they love. The guide team was full of the same great cast of characters that were on the water in 2024, with Nicholas Patchin moving into a full-time guiding role. These gentlemen have spent a lifetime, literally, on the water at Scott Lake. The average tenure of the group at Scott Lake Lodge is nearly 20 years, and over 20 years as professional guides. Our hospitality team had some new faces alongside familiar ones; the returning staff and management did a great job delivering the level of personalized customer service we strive to provide. Maintenance, similarly, was a mix of familiar and first-year staff; they wore out some boots with all the miles on the island. It was a great year, and we are hopeful to have the group return. The most significant change was in the kitchen; it was a whole new group, led by Chef O'Shea. They came together and did a first-rate job in their first year. We are excited and hopeful that this kitchen will be with us for years to come. Looking ahead to 2026, we have a great returning crew ready to hit the ground running, a few new faces will grace the island, but almost all the staff will be returning. This continuity allows us to expand the program we offer and raise the expectations.

EVALUATIONS:

To the 130 guests who spent some time to fill out the post-trip evaluation, THANK YOU! We pore over these with a fine-tooth comb, looking for ways to improve. They are read and re-read by our management team, who look over the suggestions and ratings and share some thoughtful praise with our teams to keep them rolling all season long. There is no note, no matter how small or insignificant, that we don't value; we're striving to get better in every way possible for the next season. Any response below Excellent is considered a miss. We set our standards high and will work to keep them there. Dining received great ratings this year despite packed lunches being an ongoing challenge. We will continue to strive to improve for the 2026 season based on your feedback. While we can't control the fishing, ratings were similar to past years; however, the tale of the tape is in the number of trophies landed. The bar is rising quickly here: 96% of the guests responding would recommend their guide to a friend. We hope to hit 100 here. We slipped a

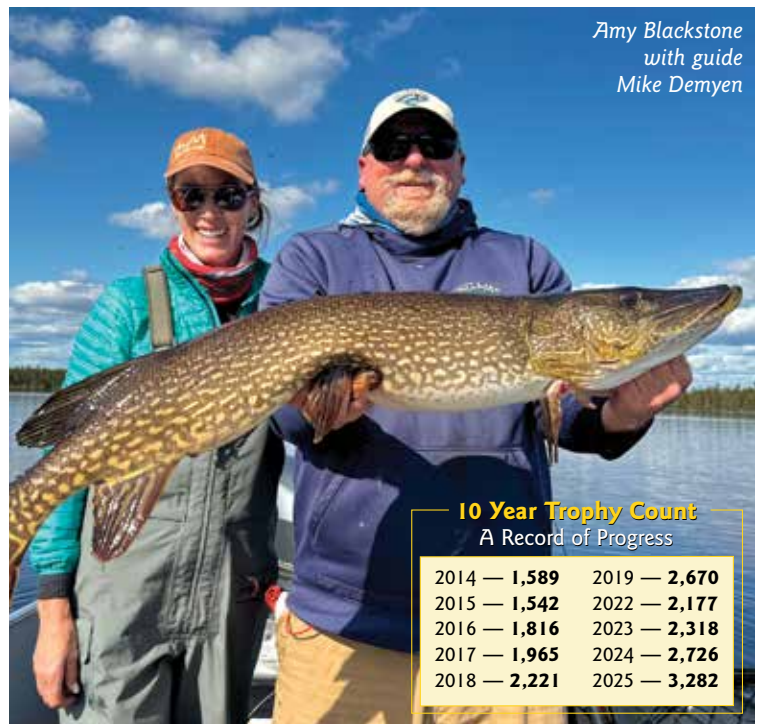

bit in the Overall Lodge Experience, with 96% excellent and 4% good. We will come back with a vengeance! The final and telling stat is the number of guests who responded Yes to "Would you recommend Scott Lake Lodge to a friend?" 100% said yes. That we will take, the others will keep the weekly management calls full of ideas until the ice comes off and we are back where we love to be once more.

Fishing by the Numbers:

Both the total trophies at 3,282 and the number of pike trophies at 2,295 set records in 2025; these are incredible numbers to live up to. High water and decent weather were in our favour. The consistent increase in big fish landed speaks to our guide team and the way we handle our fish and manage our fisheries. There are more big fish being caught each year. The sheer numbers of pike over 45" this summer were incredible at 229, and the 38 fish over 47" is another high-water mark. We didn't hit 50" or 49" this year, but several 48.5 and 48" fish were landed; these are lifetime fish in any waterbody. We don't count the total fish landed each day; actually, some of our guides will toss the clickers overboard. It's vital to enjoy the unique encounter with each fish, the jump or boatside take, they are all building blocks into a great fishing trip. Anecdotally, the numbers of fish and numbers of "nice fish" in the 30's range were up this season. This bodes well for the future; more 38's lead to more 40's. A healthy, sustainable fishery lets us continue to be a part of memories that will last a lifetime, the most critical metric.

Bear of the Barrens or Tundra Bear?

The barrens. The tundra. Where the trees don't grow. The word tundra comes from a Russian word meaning "frozen arctic plain." At first glance, the landscape gives a feeling of isolation, harshness and emptiness. It is anything but empty. This unique part of the earth is teeming with life, from minuscule to grand. At the very top is a creature that's mentioned which triggers a primal section of being: The Barren Ground Grizzly is the undisputed apex predator of the far north, equally imposing as it is beautiful. Anyone who has had the privilege of an interaction will tell you they are swept with feelings from anxiety to awe.

The Barren Ground Grizzly has adapted perfectly to thrive in its domain. Claws up to 5 inches long, a prominent shoulder hump, and a "grizzled" thick coat make the appearance unmistakable. With their muscular, imposing frame, males can reach 650 pounds, are capable of quickly reaching speeds of 40 miles per hour and overturning boulders to acquire the necessary nourishment.



Being omnivorous, the grizzly's diet is diverse. The flora and fauna of the ecosystem are fully exploited. The carnivorous part is made up of moose, caribou, musk ox, and a large part of ground squirrels. The vegetation, which is nearly 70% of the total diet, varies with the season. Beginning in spring with roots and fresh growth, progressing to equisetum, blueberry and cloudberry come fall. These calories allow the bears to replenish the +/- 30% of body mass that can be lost in the 7-month hibernation.

The tundra is vast. Ranging from the far north of Alaska and northern Yukon, stretching east of the Mackenzie mountains into the NWT and Nunavut. This requires bears to remain on the move. To find enough food for themselves and their 1-3 cubs, females cover immense amounts of ground. The population is estimated at 5,000 to 7,000 animals. This forces males to range even farther to find multiple mates. This can be an area exceeding 2,500 square miles.

Our hunger for new adventure takes us farther into the wild North. In the exploration of these untouched lands and waters, we are fortunate enough on occasion to cross paths with the creatures that call them home. As your guide navigates to your next spot, don't forget to keep an eye on the shoreline. You never know who you might encounter.
